What does a Quality Control Technician do?

Quality control technicians examine nonagricultural raw materials, processed, machined, fabricated, or assembled parts or products and materials for defects, wear, and deviations from manufacturer or industry specifications. They monitor quality standards for nearly all manufactured products, including foods, textiles, clothing, glassware, motor vehicles, electronic components, computers, and structural steel. Specific duties vary across the wide range of industries in which these inspectors work. Working conditions vary by industry and establishment size. In manufacturing, it is common for most inspectors to remain at one workstation. Inspectors in some industries may be on their feet all day and have to lift heavy objects, whereas in other industries, they sit during most of their shift and read electronic printouts with massive quantities of data.

Training & Educational Opportunities

You will have plenty of employment opportunities as a Quality Control Technician, but first you will need to obtain a certificate or associate degree. Opportunities in this occupation can be improved by studying industrial and manufacturing trades in a postsecondary vocational program.

As a Quality Control Technician you will:

- Inspect, test and measure materials, products, and installations and assure compliance to specifications
- Measure dimensions of products to verify conformance to specifications
- Read blueprints to determine specifications for inspection and testing
- Record weight, temperature, grade, and moisture
- Use precision measuring instruments
